FIRE TRAINING/INFORMATION

Station Officers and Training Officers conducted and coordinated training outlined in the 2020 District Training Schedule. Training had to be modified to follow the recommendations the Center for Disease and Control and Chippewa County Health Department based on the recommend restrictions for COVID-19 pandemic. The District held in-person training for January and February. In March, all in-person training was canceled and training was made available online for all members. Monthly in person training resumed in June and virtual online training continued for members wishing not to gather because of concerns with COVID-19. In October, all in person training, again, was canceled and training was moved to online for the remainder of 2020.

The Fire District Officers met 6 times in 2020. The Officers met in person for 2 of the 6 meetings. The other 4 meetings where held virtually based on recommended restrictions by the Center for Disease and Control and Chippewa County Health Department. The Officers discussed and updated many of the Fire District Standard Operating Procedures with the input of the members. Also, there were 5 online training sessions for the Officers in 2020.

The Fire District Health and Safety Committee met 6 times in 2020. The Committee met in person for 2 of the 6 meetings to review, revise, and update District training based on COVID-19. At these meetings, any health-related, close calls, or safety concerns were review. Also, there were several Minimum Operating Guideline (MOG) for training updated in 2020.






2020 was a very exciting year for the Chippewa Fire District EMS section. The Chippewa Fire District continues to evolve to meet the service needs of our great communities and neighboring communities. We are constantly reminded of the delicate balance of service delivery and organizational wellness. Below is a brief highlight of the happenings within Chippewa Fire District EMS section for 2020.


- Chippewa Fire District had 10 Paramedics take a 48-hour refresher course, ACLS, CPR & PALS at CVTC Chippewa Falls.
- Chippewa Fire District took delivery of two Lifeline ambulances with Power load cots along with traded in two ambulances to Lifeline.
- EMS crews did numerous station tours and attended community events representing the Fire District.
- Due to COVID-19 we put daily shift training on hold but still allowed for duty station crews to train together.
- Switched EMS Medical Directors from Dr. Haselow MD to Dr. Young MD


- Throughout the year there was numerous meetings with EMS section employees to adjust operational plans as needed to continue our dedicated service to the communities served.
- Continued our EMS educational partnership with HSHS Eau Claire and entered a partnership with Marshfield Medical Centers for educational needs of the District.
- Worked with Chippewa County Health Department to direct the Chippewa Fire District on how to meet CDC & Chippewa County Health Department COVID-19 requirements.
- We had 3 applications for the 2020 career Firefighter/Paramedic eligibility list which was not conducted in 2020 due to COVID-19 restrictions.
- Bought 2 Lucas devices for doing mechanical compressions on patients in cardiac arrest for the 2 first out rigs along with trading in 2 Zoll Auto pulse units.
- Bought 2 Magrath video laryngoscopes for the 2 first out rigs then put the King vision scopes on the 2 backup rigs.
- EMS section worked with Town of Wheaton Fire & EMS Research Committee to answer questions on EMS operations.
- Received a Ferno COVID-19 Shield from Marshfield Medical Center Eau Claire for the cots
- Attended Healthy Kids public education event at Chippewa Falls YMCA.
- EMS crews had their fire inspections put on hold due to COVID-19 per Deputy Chief of Fire Prevention.
- Monthly EMS trainings were held via ZOOM with our medical direction team.
- Worked with vendors along with communities we serve to get a limited supply of COVID-19 supplies for crews to use on calls.
- Worked on updating District SOP & SOG's that relate to EMS.
- Taught several CPR classes until Sacred Heart Education Department closed, then we
 partnered with CVTC to get our members CPR certifications done.
- Replaced the District van with a Ford F-150 that is used for EMS duties by Assistant Chief assigned EMS Duties.
- Met with area medical centers & hospitals to sign transfer agreements for patient transports with reimbursements.




















Chippewa Fire District TEMS Review

- Chippewa Fire District Tactical Emergency Medical Services (TEMS) section within the Chippewa Fire District EMS section had the command taken over by Assistant Chief Mark Roshell. Long time Critical Care/Firefighter with TEMS endorsement Paramedic Nick Sprague stepped down from the team as of the 1st day of January 2020.
- The TEMS unit went with a unified command structure on the 1st day of January 2020 with Assistant Chief Roshell as the lead contact person for the District TEMS team.
- The TEMS unit put on 4 new Medics in 2020. They were sent to the TEMS training at CVTC Eau Claire which they completed the end of May 2020. With the addition of these 4, along with the 4 that were on the team, we have a total of 8 TEMS trained Medics to respond with the Eau Claire County Regional response team. We responded to a total of 23 calls for service which was 13 calls less than 2019. (8 Callouts & 15 Training)
- Our dedicated TEMS Medics have been busy staying up to date with the ever change environment we live in the past year. Our onsite training has been limited due to the COVID-19 pandemic.
- Two TEMS medics were fitted for new protective gear which was acquired from Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office budget. We expect to receive the gear early 2021.
- Our TEMS group has been training with the regional quick response team to bring them up on medical training while they are deployed in a hazard zone during civil unrest.
- Chippewa Fire District command staff continues to meet with our regional response partners yearly to discuss improvements in delivery of our services to the communities we serve for Fire, EMS & SWAT.

FIRE PREVENTION, INVESTIGATIONS, AND INSPECTIONS

The Chippewa Fire District conducts Fire Inspection and Prevention activities under the scope of Wisconsin State Statutes 101.14, 101.575 and Wisconsin Administrative Code Comm 14. Fire Inspection and Prevention activities are funded out of the Wisconsin Fire Insurance Fund of 2% of fire insurance premiums paid to the State of Wisconsin. The 2% fire dues fund, as it is called, has been a part of the State of Wisconsin Fire Insurance Commissioner's Office since before Wisconsin became a state in 1848. Each municipality of the Fire District receives a 2% Fire Dues payment prior to August 1 each year. Totals for 2020 are based on 2018 evaluation are:

Wisconsin Administrative Code also requires other activities to qualify for 2% Fire Dues. Those activities include:

- 1. Keeping a map of the territory served by the Chippewa Fire District.
- 2. A current roster of members of the department.
- 3. The date and location of fire prevention inspections performed, violations found, and corrective action taken.
- 4. Time, date and location of structure fires, and the number of fire department members responding.
- 5. Number, duration of, and attendance for fire department meetings.
- 6. Number, duration of, topic of, and attendance at fire department training sessions.
- 7. Number, duration of, topic of, and attendance at public fire education related activities.
- 8. Copy of the fire department budget and or a summary of fire dues expenditures.

9. Record of public building and places of employment located within the territory of the fire department.

The Chippewa Fire District is currently in compliance with ss 101.14, ss 101.575, and Wisconsin Administrative Code DSPS 314 and is eligible for Wisconsin 2% Fire Dues for the year 2020.

The Chippewa Fire District also performs the following inspections and services for the community:

- 1. CBRF (Home Health Care Facilities).
- 2. Fireworks Permit Inspections.
- 3. Fire Prevention Education Stillson School, individual and group tours at Stations.
- 4. Halloween Fire prevention activities for Lake Hallie and Lafayette.
- 5. Participates in supporting the Chippewa Valley Fire Safety House.
- 6. New Construction Inspections for Fire Suppression, Fire Alarm Systems, Fire Safety Systems and Construction.
- 7. Enforces Fire Burning Regulations in the Towns of Hallie, Lafayette, Howard and the Village of Lake Hallie. Assists with fire regulations in Town of Wheaton.
- 8. Responds to Fire Safety request for services and provides information on Wisconsin Fire Safety Rules and Regulations from its residents.
- 9. Approves requests for Knox Box installations.
- 10. Responds to complaints and requests from other local governmental agencies for assistance in enforcement and code interpretation.

We serve 249 Fire Departments in 28 counties for the Department of Agriculture Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP). To date, annual inspections are only about 35% completed due to COVID-19. With the stay-at-home orders annual inspections were put on hold, although the installs and removals were continued. Many businesses have also been inaccessible or not allowing visitors for inspections. My goal is trying to make up for most of the lost time after vaccinations.

The Tank Programs biggest issue right now is the <5k ASTs being removed from payable inspections list starting Oct 2019. This was due to an audit of the statue language and was found to not match that of ATCP 93 codes. The statute states no enforcement authority for ASTs <5k. Although, the tanks are still supposed to follow codes including NFPA, but we are not paid nor able to enforce under the tank side. If needed, it can be enforced by local FD level.

This change caused CFD to lose 872 of the 1408 tanks we had. In addition, almost all plan reviews since we only did the reviews for tanks <5k. We urged DATCP to allow CFD to take on more territory to recoup some of the lost revenue. CFD did take on 81 more FD areas which added 536 inspectable tanks. If it were not for the pandemic, this extra area would have helped keep the program closer to being self-sustainable.

There was effort put in for the return the regulatory enforcement back to ATCP 93 early 2020, this did not get addressed due to the COVID pandemic taking priority. The Tank Division has been trying to move this back along in hopes to get the small tanks back. Losing these tanks not only hurts our budget, but it also makes it more conducive to fire and life safety issues in addition to more environmental contamination.
