## **Insurance Services Office (ISO) Rating**

ISO creates ratings for fire departments and their surrounding communities. The ratings calculate how well-equipped fire departments are to put out fires in that community. The audit reviews the fire prevention and fire suppression capabilities to develop a numerical grading called a Public Protection Classification. The Chippewa Fire District was audited in September of 2022 and maintained its rates of a 3 for the Village of Lake Hallie and 5/10 for the Townships of Hallie, Lafayette, and Howard.

#### FIRE & EMS TRAINING

Fire Training: Station Officers and Training Officers conducted and coordinated training outlined in the 2023 District Training Schedule. The District held in-person and online training options. EMS Training: Captain Arriola conducted and coordinated training outlined in the 2023 District Training Schedule for our Medical First Responders.

Officer Training: There were 6 online training sessions for the Officers in 2023.

The Fire District Health and Safety Committee met 6 times in 2023. The Committee met in person with the option for virtual attendance for all meetings. At these meetings, any health-related, close calls, or safety concerns were reviewed.

### **District EMS**

2022 was a very busy and yet exciting year for the Chippewa Fire District EMS section. As the need for Firefighter/EMT continues grow and the shortage of trained individuals seeking to work in fire and ems, the Chippewa Fire District has evolved to meet the service needs of our great communities and neighboring communities. We have implemented field training program for all new members wishing to work on the ambulance. This has helped better prepare our EMTs to better service in these challenging times. To combat this shortage of FF/EMTs, The District has and continues to sponsor members of our department for Emergency Medical Technician, Advanced Emergency Medical Technician, Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic, and Critical Care Emergency Medical Technician Paramedic classes.

#### **District TEMS**

Chippewa Fire District Tactical Emergency Medical Services (TEMS) section within the Chippewa Fire District EMS section was commanded by Captain Peter Arriola.

The team responded to 21 events in 2023 (6 callouts &15 trainings)

Three employees (2 career and 1 part-time) complete TEMS training.

Several medics were fitted for new protective gear which was acquired from Eau Claire County Sheriff's Office budget.

Our TEMS group has been training with the regional quick response team to bring them up on medical training while they are deployed in a hazard zone during civil unrest.

Chippewa Fire District command staff continues to meet with our regional response partners yearly to discuss improvements in delivery of our services to the communities we serve for Fire, EMS & SWAT.

### FIRE PREVENTION ACTIVITIES

The Chippewa Fire District conducts Fire Inspection and Prevention activities under the scope of Wisconsin State Statutes 101.14, 101.575 and Wisconsin Administrative Code Comm. 14. Such Fire Inspection and Prevention activities are funded out of the Wisconsin Fire Insurance Fund of 2% of fire insurance premiums paid to the State of Wisconsin. The 2% fire dues fund as it is called has been a part of the State of Wisconsin Fire Insurance Commissioner's Office since before Wisconsin became a state in 1848. Each municipality of the Fire District receives a 2% Fire Dues payment prior to August 1 each year and part of the overall budget for the Fire District. The Fire District did 23 Public Education Events in 2023.

### **Fire Investigation**

The Chippewa Fire District is in compliance with: ss 165.55 Arson investigation (1) The chief of the fire department or company of every city, village, or town in which a fire department or company exists, and where no fire department or company exists, the mayor, village president or town clerk shall investigate or cause to be investigated the cause, origin and circumstances or every fire occurring in his city, village, or town when the damage exceeds \$500. Where any investigation discloses that the fire may be of incendiary origin, it shall report the same to the state fire marshal. Fires in the Chippewa Fire District are investigated per the above statutory mandate.

### **2023 Fire Inspector Report**

Throughout the calendar year 2023 I have been able to complete at least one inspection at every facility that we have records of. There were close to 450 inspections throughout the district. Most people have responded well to correcting violations.

The last part of the year I have done 30 short-term rental inspections in Lafayette.

I have worked on streamlining our new burning permit process including maintaining a spreadsheet to track where known fires are located on a given day. I have regularly conducted site inspections for large fire burning requests. In addition, I consulted on, learned from, attended, and verified new or replacement fire pumps, sprinklers, and fire alarm systems.

I have done public education multiple times and stations 1 & 3, in addition to Rymes and Rainbows and Stillson Elementary. I have been working on creating a better tracking system for our pub ed materials for all stations, so we are not out of supplies when needed.

I have partnered with Community Safety Net for donations where we received 147 older children's books at no cost to CFD.

As a member of the WI State Fire Inspectors Association, I have attended the quarterly trainings/meetings, one of which I created and presented a basic training on storage tanks. I also attended the WSFIA annual Fire Inspectors conference for all-day classes.

Because of my history as a driver/operator instructor for the colleges, I provide ambulance driver training and burning permits training to all new EMTs

I worked on getting a new ordinance for commercial occupancy permit to be put into place. In hopes it will help keep us aware of buildings being built and occupied without us even knowing, since we only get information when there are sprinklers/alarms systems.

## **Dive Team**

The Dive Team response to all water related emergencies within the Chippewa Fire District and mutual aid to Chippewa County Fire Departments under the county wide mutual aid agreement.

The dive team responded to 5 calls in 2023 down from 11 calls in 2022.

There were 3 trainings and 3 meetings held for the year.

There are 18 members on the team (11 divers and 7 Support members).
